- 12 paramedics
- Class 5 rating

<u>Crooked Creek Fire Department</u> – Steven Lytle, Chief

- Trying to hire their first full-time personnel
- Increase part-time
- Current roster is 26

- Added on a used tanker to the fleet
- UTV and trailer package bought by grant
- Trying to find another large tanker

<u>Dysartsville Fire Department</u> - Nick Washburn, Chief

- 376 calls this fiscal year
- 27 volunteers, 3 juniors, 1 paid
- Took over the community building (\$200k)
- Looking to purchase/lease property to have a substation to help with call volume
- 50th anniversary on July 22nd
- Wants incentives for volunteers
- Needs water access

Hankins-North Fork Fire Department - Ray Hollifield, Chief

- YTD May 11th 237 calls, 1258 personnel response, 5.3 persons per call
- Completed 2026.5 training hours
- 28 volunteers, 6 part-time
- Secured Engine 19
- Purchased new boat w/ fire pump
- Drone program
- Working on rescue certification
- Wants a full-time engineer

Marion Fire Department - Ray McDaniel, Chief

- 13 volunteers, 12 full-time, 2 part-time, 2 juniors
- Class 3 certification
- March 2022 medium rescue
- 1360 calls, 22% are overlapping
- 300 calls were EMS
- In 2022, 5,489 training hours were completed
- Grant to help pay for 2 engines
- SAFER Grant for 3 personnel; 100% paid for 3 years
- Applied to AFG Grant

Nebo Fire Department - Rick Simmons, Chief

- 1 paid; not manned on the weekends
- 376 calls this year
- 28 volunteers
- Fire boat coming in mid-winter hopefully

Old Fort Fire Department - Ron Richardson, Chief

- 28 volunteers
- 5 part-time
- In 2022, there were 884 calls 40% of the calls are medical
- Maintain fire protection service
- Working on medium rescue certification
- Need more people recruitment and retention

PG Fire Department - Neil Settlemyre, Chief

- 42 members, 1 full-time, 9 part-time
- In 2022, there were 690 calls
- New addition was completed on the building
- Bought a new truck "Rescue 11"
- As of March 2023, the staff obtained the following certifications: heavy rescue, ag. rescue, swift water high angle, and medical responder
- \$45k from the state \$35k went to new turnout gear and machines to wash the gear,
 \$10k went to supplies for the truck
- Needs a new engine
- Class 5 rating

Sugar Hill-Montford Cove Fire Department - Joe Washburn, Chief

- 613 calls last fiscal year
- 25 volunteers, 3 juniors
- 2 full-time, 7 part-time
- 23 certified firefighters, 19 medical certifications, 13 rescue certifications
- Applied to the AFG grant for a washer and dryer for gear and hoses
- Added a rescue engine to the fleet
- Class 4 certification
- Broke ground on a new building
- Medium rescue

Woodlawn Fire Department - Keith Stockton, Chief

- 25 volunteers, 2 junior, 1 cadet
- 3 part-time
- 1 Full-time
- Mid-300 range of calls
- Bought a new truck and converted it to a brush truck

McDowell Rescue - Brian Gentry, Chief

- 1,617 calls 61% medical, 39% rescue, fire, and other related areas
- Trying to update the Standard Operating Procedures within City limits
- Renewed certification in various areas
- 1,930.3 training hours
- Drone services

<u>Forest Service</u> – Weston Vandenabeele, County Ranger

- In 2022, there were 84 responses to wildfires
- 5-year average 38 wildfires a year
- Debris burn is the number one cause of forest fires
- Truck should be here this year

McDowell Fire Rescue Association - Brian Piercy, President

- Purchased dummies for training
- Received a grant for recruitment and retention
- The association is giving out two 1,500 training grants to a department in McDowell County

<u>Emergency Management</u> – William Kehler, Director

- 10,554 calls
- 84,631 911 calls
- Working on FEMA generator grants
- Closing out Tropical Storm Fred issues

Joe Washburn discussed the positivity of Viper radios and stocking the County. The training grounds need to be improved.
